
- To create an integrated clinical and academic Urology Program

Surgical Wait Time is Front and Centre in Canadian Urology

The CUA and Astra Zeneca have teamed up to support an upcoming national meeting in early December entitled "Surgical Wait Times Initiative in Urological Oncology (SWAT)".

A steering committee and national faculty of leading academic and community uro-oncologists and advisors, chaired by Dr. Neil Fleshner, our Socioeconomics Committee Chair, have undertaken an initiative to study surgical wait times in urological cancers (prostate, bladder, renal, testes).

The findings will serve as a basis for recommendations to assist our members, administrators at all levels, our patients and government in devising and implementing an appropriate Surgical Wait Times Strategy to improve patient outcomes. This is timely, as you all know from the press coverage of what our patients consider to be the #1 issue in Canadian health care.

Specific objectives include a review of existing literature about the impact of surgical wait times on disease specific outcomes in urological malignancies; a survey of Canadian urologic oncologists to collect data on current wait times in order to assess average duration of wait times; and an analysis of patient or regional factors to identify potential barriers.

The SWAT initiative faculty will meet to discuss the study in December at the Kingbridge Centre, just north of Toronto. Upon completion of analysis and building of consensus, the findings and recommendations will be published and presented at the 2006 CUA National Conference in Halifax.

Office of Education

Following the creation of the Canadian Urological Association Central Office, our Executive Committee began discussions looking at the benefits of using these new resources to establish a CUA Office of Education (OE) that would be similar to those operated by many other medical associations.

I was given the mandate to investigate how this could be done and then present recommendations at our Executive meeting in Ottawa that was held this past June. To prepare this report, Executive Secretary Richard Bolton and Meetings Manager Carol Damiani researched the OEs of various associations, namely the AUA, the EAU and the SOGC, gathering literature and organizational charts.

CUA President Michael Jewett joined Carol, Richard and me on a visit to the SOGC office in Ottawa, where we spoke at length with Executive Vice-President André Lalonde, the physician responsible for its OE.

Subsequent to this discussion, we held an internal meeting where it appeared quite obvious that there would be numerous advantages to establishing an OE similar to that of the SOGC that would allow us to place all our educational activities under one roof, thereby improving their coordination. We would thus achieve continuity between needs assessment, practice guidelines, resident training needs, continuing professional development workshops for practicing urologists, regional/annual meeting organization, and production of educational materials and patient information brochures.

In light of these observations, we suggested grouping under the heading of the CUA Office of Education the already existing


committees concerned with educational issues. We then analyzed our educational needs and modified our current organizational chart in order to design a structure best suited to our requirements (Figure 1). (Note that all existing CUA committees appear on this chart.) This OE initiative was presented in August 2005 to our industry partners, whose feedback was enthusiastic. In fact, with increasingly stringent Rx & D guidelines, and demand for needs- and evidence-based training, companies are eager to cooperate with well-structured and educationally strong medical associations.

In order to create an OE that is fully functional, a change in our current organizational structure would be required. This would entail that the Executive committee, composed of the President, President-Elect, Vice-President, Past-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Chair of the Office of Education, and five representatives from the five Canadian regions (the Western region, the Prairies, Ontario, Quebec, and the Maritimes), would take on a strategic role. Operational aspects, on the other hand, would be divided into three sections: educational activities under the Education Committee, headed by the OE Chair; financial activities under the Treasurer; and finally, corporate and member relations under the Secretary.

These changes to our organizational structure will be discussed at the upcoming Winter Executive meeting in Halifax. I invite the members to voice their comments by either sending an e-mail or letter, to my attention, care of the CUA Central Office.

Dr. Kirk Lo received his medical degree and Urologic training at McGill University. He was awarded the prestigious American Foundation of Urologic Diseases (AFUD) Scholarship to study under Drs. Larry I.

Lipshultz and Dolores J. Lamb at Baylor College of Medicine in the field of Male Reproductive Medicine and Surgery.

Dr. Lo's primary interest and expertise are in the area of Testicular failure and Andrology. He is currently performing research in the utilization of stem cells for the treatment of male infertility and hypogonadism.

Dr. Peter Pommerville Victoria, BC

Dr. Peter Pommerville, a practicing urologist, is an active staff member of the Vancouver Island Health Authority, which includes the Royal Jubilee Hospital and Victoria General Hospital.

Among his scholarly and professional activities, Dr. Pommerville has conducted numerous clinical trials in ED, BPH, Prostate Cancer and Urinary Incontinence. He is a guest lecturer in the Department of Continuing Education at the University of Victoria and holds the position of Clinical Instructor in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of British Columbia. He is also a regular reviewer for The Canadian Medical Association Journal.

Dr. Pommerville is a member of several professional organizations, including the Canadian Continence Foundation, Canadian Urological Association, Canadian Male Sexual Health Council, and the American Urological Association. He is also the Vice-Chair of the Canadian Male Sexual Health Council and a past president of the Northwest Urological Society.

Dr. Pommerville received his medical degree from the University of Ottawa in 1978 and became a fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons Canada in 1984.

Dr. Luis Henrique Perocco Braga University of Toronto

Dr. Braga obtained his medical degree from the Federal University of Minas Gerais (UFMG), Brazil, in 1993. He stayed at UFMG to do a residency in general surgery from 1994 to 1996 followed by a residency in pediatric surgery from 1996 to 1999.



In 1999 he went to Roen, France, to pursue a fellowship in pediatric urology, under the supervision of Professor Mitrofanoff. The following year, in Lyon, France, he completed a fellowship in pediatric urology under the supervision of Professor Mouriquand.

In 2001, Dr. Braga obtained a Masters of Science degree in surgery from UFMG. He practiced as a consulting pediatric urologist from 2001 to 2005 and was Assistant Professor of Surgery at UFMG from 2003 to 2004.

Dr. Braga is currently doing a fellowship in Pediatric Urology at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto.

Dr. Xiaodong Zhang McGill University



Dr. Xiadong Zhang is an oncologist and urologist at the Peoples Hospital, and Director of the Department of Urology, Beijing Chaoyang Hospital, in Beijing, China.

Dr. Zhang completed his undergraduate studies at Bethune Medical University in Beijing in 1984 and went on to do postgraduate studies there. He obtained his Master of Science degree in 1988 based on his research "detection of urinary SIg in patients with bladder cancer." Subsequently, from 1991 to 1994, Dr. Zhang continued his education at the Western Cancer Center of Germany, at Essen University in Germany, where he was visiting scholar, investigating "the cytogenic analysis of testicular cancer." In 1996 he obtained his medical degree and PhD from Peking University.

From 1995 to the present, Dr. Zhang has worked as a researcher, focusing on urodynamics and neurourology, in the Uro-oncology Department at Peking University. From 1999 to the present, he has been a Professor of Urology at Peking University. In 2002, he was a visiting scientist at the Urological Department, Noris Cancer Comprehensive Diagnosis Center, University of South California, in Los Angeles.

Dr. Zhang is the author of over 20 publications in Chinese medical journals.

Highlights of the Annual General Meeting 2005

- The Annual General Meeting of the CUA took place on June 29, 2005 in Ottawa. The following are highlights of the meeting. Any CUA member wishing a full set of minutes for either the AGM or the CUA Summer Executive Meeting 2005 may contact either the secretary or central office, and we would be pleased to forward either an electronic or paper copy for your review.
- The CUA Central Office has now been providing administrative support for the organization for two years. Every CUA member by now should have received a membership card containing their membership number and contact co-ordinates for the central office. There will be an effort to upgrade the CUA Website under the guidance of the IT Committee and its new chair Dr. Ken Pace. The membership number will become necessary to access members-only portions of the redesigned site, which will hopefully bolster the ability of the CUA to provide on-line CPD activities and the ability of members to discuss difficult cases with peers. The Central Office will be assuming a new role with the CUA meeting in Halifax 2006 - that of meeting organization. This is the second of the planned roles that the office will assume.
- Dr. Jerzy Gajewski, our treasurer, reported that the CUA continues on a solid financial footing. The CUA meeting in Whistler 2004 generated a significant amount of excess revenue for our organization, and Drs. Goldenberg, Moore and Gleave were congratulated for the success of this meeting. Later in the AGM Dr. Gajewski presented the CUA budget for the upcoming year. The budget is balanced with no deficit projected.
- Dr. Michael Leonard, our secretary, reported that the CUA remains stable as regards membership. A large bolus of candidate members has infused our ranks with new blood, which bodes well for the future of our organization.
- Dr. Leonard additionally reported that venues for the CUA Annual Meeting are now confirmed up to and including 2009. Beyond that there are three proposals which look to be solid, although contracts have yet to be signed with convention centers /hotels.

- The CUA AGM was adjourned and the CUASF AGM called to order. Dr. Hassan Razvi reported that the assets of the CUASF continue to grow and position us to continue to support individuals pursuing research in academic and community settings. Dr. Ron Gerridzen, our president, publicly acknowledged the great effort and solid stewardship that Dr. Razvi has given over the past 5 years as chair of the Administrative Council of the CUASF. The members applauded Dr. Razvi on the termination of his mandate.
- The CUA AGM was reconvened and Dr. Joe Chin presented the TEE report on behalf of Dr. Jim Wilson. There were three urology programs reviewed by the Royal College over the past year. University of Ottawa received full approval, whilst the University of Alberta received provisional approval and Laval University received provisional approval with external review. The RCPSC Urology Exam Committee will change chairs this coming year, with Dr. Joe Chin completing his mandate and Dr. Michael Leonard starting his.
- Dr. Sender Herschorn presented the Guidelines Committee report. This committee continues its good work with two new guidelines approved this year: Urinary Incontinence and BPH. Work continues on Neurogenic Bladder, Andropause, Superficial Bladder Cancer, and Ureteric Stones, and Sports and Children with solitary kidneys. Previously published guidelines are being reviewed to assess whether they are still appropriate given passage of time.
- Dr. Mike Jewett, chair of Bylaws Committee, recommended two bylaws changes, which the membership approved. The first involved the use of the CUA logo, which must be appended to any CPD materials approved by the CUA as per the Royal College stipulations. The second addressed the issue of quorum at the AGM, which has a times been compromised by poor attendance. Quorum now comprises 10% of the Active Membership. This in no way diminishes the ability of Senior members to cast their votes on any issue.
- Dr. Rob Siemens reported that the Patient Information Committee is continuing to draft new topics for Series 9,

which will be released in the fall of 2005. There have now been more than 1 million brochures shipped since the project started 5 years ago. This is a remarkable achievement. In addition, a co-distribution arrangement with the Canadian Prostate Health Council has been reached. This should make the CPHC brochures more readily available than had been the case in the past.

- Dr. Mike Jewett reported that the arrangements for the CUA Annual Meeting Halifax 2006 are coming along well. This will be the first meeting in which the central office will assume a major role in meeting organization.
- Brief mention was made of a task force headed by Dr. Luc Valiquette. The purpose of this task force will be to examine the potential of establishing an Office of Education for the CUA. This may also require reorganization of the CUA's corporate structure. The membership will be appraised of the findings of this task force at the next AGM. Some information regarding this process is contained earlier in this newsletter.

• The recommended slate for the CUA was presented and approved by the membership. The officers for the CUA are listed earlier in this newsletter.

Report from the 60th Annual Meeting in Ottawa

We left Ottawa and the 60th Annual Meeting of our Association enriched after participating in an exciting scientific program organized by Chris Morash and his committee. The local arrangements by Stuart Oake were outstanding. Our association gets stronger each year, even after 60 years of existence. Ron Gerridzen's many years of experience on the Executive board made him the compleat President this past year. He set a number of initiatives in motion that we will sustain and build on. Thank you Ron, and we extend our thanks to your wife Patty too!

Dr. Ron Gerridzen, Past-President of the CUA, chairs the Nominating Committee for 2005-2006. The Nominating Committee has the responsibility to ensure that all positions on the CUA Executive are filled.
