Dear Colleagues:

Your Executive held their regular Winter Meeting in Halifax on February 7, and I will summarize the main items of importance that were discussed.

Dr. Said Awad outlined the scientific program for the June Meeting in Halifax, details of which are presented below. Some 95 submissions were received and a rich and varied program has been arranged. A record number of exhibitors will be participating. Dr. Philip Belitsky presented some details of an exciting social program. A separate children's program has also been organized in anticipation of a large number of children attending the meeting. Registration forms are enclosed, and I would encourage you to complete the hotel forms as soon as possible, as a large number of registrants is expected.

Treasurer, Dr. Bruce Piercy, reported that the 1987 Meeting at Banff produced a surplus of \$19,000 and that the financial status of our Association is sound.

Dr. John Collins submitted the Time and Place Report supporting the Bonaventure Hotel, Montreal, as the site for the 1995 Meeting. This will be the 50th anniversary of the Association. This report was approved by the Executive.

Dr. Sender Herschorn presented the results of the 1988 Hospital Survey of current urological facilities, urological bed usage, and hospital-based manpower requirements. The national average of 8.7 beds/urologist remains unchanged from the previous survey in 1982. Twenty percent of hospitals had cystoscopies performed by non-urologists (mainly gynaecologists) and 24% of hospitals had some urological procedures (mainly vasectomies) performed by non-urologists. The full report of the Economics and Manpower Committee is included as an insert.

Because of the increased numbers of non-urologists becoming involved in the area of urodynamics and female urology, a task force chaired by Dr. Said Awad, was established to set training and practice standards in these areas. Their report will be submitted to the Executive in June.

The question of the establishment of a central secretariat was discussed. Information from an informal survey of a number of medical organizations with a permanent secretariat was presented. After considerable discussion it was felt that

it was not an opportune time to establish such a secretariat. The main deterrents were the relatively high cost, the limited revenue sources of the CUA and the large financial committment to the Scholarship Foundation. Instead, the Executive is investigating the establishment of a computer data base and computer-based mailing list which would facilitate the work of the Association.

A proposal to organize a forum for urology residents to be held at the time of the Annual Meeting is being explored. Dr. Collins will submit a report on this matter to the Executive in June.

A Canadian Society of Surgical Oncology is being established, composed of persons primarily interested in the care of cancer patients. The inaugural meeting will be held in September 1988 at the Annual Meeting of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada. The Society is seeking founding members.
