President's Report

The CUA Executive met in Montréal for an unprecedented one-day strategic planning retreat in January. The day was spent discussing the future direction of the Association. Here is a summary of our perspective.

We are the only national organization representing Canadian urology. Our

60-year history gives us a strong sense of tradition and generates loyalty among our members. We have a well-established and recognized set of "products," including the CUA Annual Meeting, CUAJ, the patient information brochures and clinical practice guidelines. These services are unique and well-differentiated from those of our neighbours.

The CUA has a superb tradition of volunteerism by its members. The leadership of the organization has attracted some of the most able and talented members from across Canada.

Like any organization, we have our challenges:

The organization has not been active in many

aspects of urologic practice, such as fee schedule disparities and negotiation, public health advocacy, lobbying for federal and provincial resource allocation, and national manpower planning.

- · Some urologists choose not to belong to the CUA. Some CUA members, especially those in community practice, do not identify strongly with the organization.
- · We are dependent on industry support for our financial health.
- · Changing patterns in the practice of urology may have downstream effects which are difficult to anticipate.

The following themes were felt to be priorities over the next 5 years:

- 1. Meeting the needs of both academic and community urologists;
- 2. Being involved in education and practice support;
- 3. Enhancing advocacy;
- 4. Seeking financial stability and sustainability;
- 5. Differentiating ourselves while partnering with other national and international organizations.

The results of this strategic planning process will be presented to CUA members at the June meeting in Toronto. Members should plan to attend so that their voices may be heard.



Highlights from the 2009 Winter Executive Meeting

Uniquely this year, the Executive Meeting was preceded by a full-day strategic planning workshop under the direction of Jane Cooke-Lauder of Bataleur Enterprises Inc. of Toronto. She is a consultant for health-related non-profit organizations. The objective of this workshop was to produce a roadmap for the CUA for the next 5 years so that we can better serve the needs of our members. We expect to present this plan to members at our Annual General Meeting in Toronto. Please plan to attend.

Following our strategic planning workshop, we had the opportunity to tour the Central Office. It was nice for us to visit with our hardworking staff and better understand the functions and processes of our administrative infrastructure. We then headed for dinner during which the CUA Executives had a chance to interact with and thank several of our Patron Sponsors.

The next morning, Dr. Laurence Klotz, called the Executive Meeting to order. One area of growth is the organization of the Annual Meeting. Every year, a new Local Organizing Committee (LOC) and a Scientific Program Committee (SPC) are formed to plan the content and format of the upcoming Annual Meeting. It has become apparent that we have not developed a turn-key mechanism or manual to assist these committees and pass on the experience of previous meeting committees. For this reason, the CUA has formed, the Annual Meeting Planning Committee, to oversee the organization of our Annual Meeting with a long-term perspective. This Committee is made up of the LOC and SPC Chairs of the preceding, current and following Annual Meetings under the leadership of the Vice-President Education and with the valued

input of our expert meeting planners at the Central Office.

The role of Health Councils within the CUA was discussed once again. Over the years, several Health Councils have been formed to address specific areas of interest, provide education and advise our partners in industry. Currently, the CUA has relationships with the Canadian Male Sexual Health Council, the Canadian Prostate Health Council and the Canadian Urology Research Consortium. Our bylaws impose membership and reporting obligations on these Councils which have been seen as onerous for them. As such, the Bylaws Committee has proposed that the Health Council designation be abolished in favour of having these organizations become Affiliates of the CUA for which the requirements are fewer.

Over the last year, much effort has gone into improving communication with our membership. This includes updating the format and content of this newsletter, a new website, and improved e-mail correspondence. It has become apparent that our contact information is incorrect for a significant portion of our members, primarily in the Senior and Candidate categories. To ensure that our roster information is current, we encourage all members to log in to our password-protected members-only web area (www.cua.org/cuamembership/) and update their profile.

After two full days of meetings, your CUA representatives were satisfied that much had been accomplished on your behalf with the goal of improving the practice of urology in Canada. We encourage you to avail yourself of all of the new services and opportunities that the CUA provides and to become involved in setting our course for the future. The Scientific Committee has been overwhelmed this year with a record number of submissions. Over 270 high quality abstracts were received not only from Canada but from the U.S. and other countries. Many excellent abstracts were reviewed covering a wide range of urologic topics.

We have invited 7 superb guest speakers who are known not only for their innovative ideas and contributions to our specialty but also for being excellent teachers and communicators.

The invited faculty in uro-oncology include Dr. Jay Smith, Professor and Chair at Vanderbilt University in Nashville, TN, and Dr. Peter Carroll, Professor and Chair at the University of California in San Francisco. Dr. Smith will be giving the State-of-the-Art Lecture on bladder cancer, and Dr. Carroll will be giving one on prostate cancer. Dr. Doug Canning from the Children's Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania will give the lecture in pediatric urology. Dr. Ralph Clayman, Professor and Chair at the University of California at Irvine will give the Royal College Lecture on urologic education and the State-of-the-Art Lecture in stones and endourology. Dr. Roger Dmochowski, also from Vanderbilt University will give the lecture in female urology. Dr. Tom Lue from the University of California at San Francisco will present on priapism.

Dr. Steven Kaplan from Columbia University will speak on BPH/LUTS.

There will be 7 educational fora. Most of the guest speakers will participate in these sessions along with Canadian experts from across the country. The sessions will focus on topics in incontinence, pediatric urology, stones, non-muscle-invasive bladder cancer risk reduction in prostate cancer, advanced prostate cancer, and BPH/LUTS. All of these sessions will be clinically relevant and provide up-to-date information for patient care.

Many high quality submissions for the CUA Prize Essay award were received this year in prostate and bladder cancer, pediatrics, and laparoscopy. The winner will present his/her work at the meeting. This year there will be podium, moderated poster, moderated video, and unmoderated poster sessions.

All of this scientific and educational activity in advance of the 64th Annual Meeting of the CUA means that Canadian urology is in excellent health and has an exciting future. If are a practicing urologist or student at any level, this meeting is a "must-attend" for you.

Treasurer's Report

The global slowdown is upon us and has delivered significant financial challenges to the economy in general and also to our Association. Economic retraction has resulted in the pharmaceutical industry reassessing their marketing and industry support dollars. Our Association has responded to this challenge by revising our industry sponsorship agreement with the intent of optimizing industry support. Our 2009 annual revenue will be slightly less than 2008 as a direct reflection

of a much-broadened sponsorship agreement that is making our Association significantly more attractive to industry in general. The agreement will be expanded further in the years to come and this is a reflection of the CUA's flexibility and ability to provide improved return on investment for our industry partners.

The last year has thrown some significant financial challenges at the CUA. These challenges have included the financial implications of the expansion of the Office of Education, the initiation of the CUAJ, and the negotiation with the SIU of a new cost-sharing arrangement. Sound financial planning has allowed the CUA to support these initiatives with financial confidence. The CUA's investment in these projects has resulted in a broadening revenue stream that will ultimately decrease our reliance on industry dollars, leading to improved self-sufficiency.

As a result of these new initiatives, as well as the current economic times in which we find ourselves, the Finance Committee is forecasting a moderate deficit for the 2009 financial year. We have been actively planning to correct this situation by improving efficiencies within all Divisions of the CUA and anticipate a short-lived deficit situation.

Thanks go out to the Central Office staff, Tiffany Pizioli (Director of Office of Education), Isabel Kolodny (Membership and Financial Services, CUA Central Office), and Sandy Wetstein (Neal, Pallett & Townsend Chartered Accountants) for their ongoing work and support on behalf of our Association.

For the first time, booth space has been reserved at the upcoming AUA meeting in Chicago at the end of April. The CUA Reception at AUA has been confirmed for Monday, April 27, 2009 at 19:30-21:30 at the Hilton Hotel – see page 9 for more details.

The major effort in the membership area in 2009 was put toward the implementation of a password protected Members-Only area in time for 2009 annual dues payment. This process presented a major challenge because of security concerns and the inherent complexity of the operation. Members are now able to review the history of

their payments over recent years, pay their annual dues by VISA or MasterCard and print the appropriate receipt.

The new "look" for the CUA website with mirrored bilingual content has now been active for about eight months. Maintenance, updating and improvement of content continue to represent a significant effort. In the Members-Only area, several additional functionalities are being considered, to include a membership directory, posting of "non-public" documents, surveys and a discussion forum.

Along with the Annual Meeting Planning Committee, the Central Office is working to establish and formalize standard procedures for the organization of the CUA Annual Meeting, including destination reviews, selection criteria, dates and format, industry support and meeting structure.

CUA 2008 Edmonton Meeting Recap

I hope that all of you who attended have fond memories of the scientific and social programs. The 2008 Local Organizing Committee took great care in attending to every detail.

The meeting attracted 844 registrants. Attendance by CUA members was on par with prior years, while the number of industry colleagues was down, likely due to our location outside of Central Canada and the impact the new Rx&D guidelines on physician-industry interaction.

Our Scientific Program Co- Chairs, Dr. Tim Wollin and Dr. Michael Hobart delivered beyond expectations. A new format for academic sessions reserved podium presentations for guest speakers, while educational fora allowed for more in-depth exploration of various specific areas. All 253 accepted academic abstract submissions were presented in smaller group poster or video sessions to maximize discussion among participants.

When it came to the first-ever Canadian presentation of a live side-by-side prostate surgery, we held our breath! The surgeries were performed at the Royal Alexandra Hospital and broadcast in simulcast at the Shaw Convention Center. Open radical prostatectomy, performed by University of Alberta alumnus Dr. Gary Lieskovsky, was projected on one screen, while the DaVinci robotic prostatectomy by Dr. Tom Ahlering, working in an adjacent room, was projected on another. The 300 viewers had the unique experience of watching the robotic procedure in true 3-D projection. Many thanks go to the local organizing team, the Edmonton Center for the Advancement of Minimally Invasive Surgery, the regional health authority and industry sponsors.

The Shaw was the site of our Welcome Reception where floor-to-ceiling windows gave us a glorious view of the city. About 500 people attended the Fun-Night at Fort Edmonton Park, where enjoyed a great Alberta steak BBQ and a dance. Few of us will

- Met its publication deadlines and achieved consistent advertising revenue.
- Decreased its publication lag.

 while ensuring a meticulous and
 comprehensive review for our authors.
- Increased its pool of reviewers.
 The CUAJ reviewer list has almost doubled from its first year this is a testament to the growing credibility of the Journal within the urological community.
- Continued to ensure that its layout is user-friendly.

CUAJ is also creating a more user-friendly web presence on the CUA website (www.cua.org). You can access the Journal through the CUA site or through www.cuaj.ca. We have posted a comprehensive, one-stop support for authors. In this section, you will find:

In the midst of this growth, we are also experiencing our own challenges. As you may be aware, the business of journal publishing has experienced a decrease in advertising revenue. This decrease stems from an overall decrease in journal advertising and a paucity of new drugs entering the market. In order to meet this challenge and maintain our financial growth, we have sought ways to diversity our revenue stream, by introducing more supplements, reprints, classified advertis-



ing and web banner advertising through the *CUAJ* electronic table of contents (e-TOC).

We look forward to the coming year and will continue to meet our objective of delivering high-quality and intellectually stimulating urological manuscripts.

Ongoing CURC trials

The Canadian Urology Research Consortium (CURC) is a non-profit group offering clinical trials and associated infrastructure; it is open to all CUA members. Centralized pharmaceutical negotiations, in terms of study design and budget, are provided by CURC professionals and assistance is provided to researchers throughout the trial. CURC is closely linked with the Canadian Urology Oncology Group and some oncology trials are available through either group. As part of this close relationship we are happy to announce the C2R retreat which will be held in Montréal, September 25-27, 2009. This year's theme is "Tailoring Urologic Treatments to the Spectrum of Disease" and will be of interest to those involved in clinical trials or thinking about getting involved.

Current CURC trials recruiting subjects:

- Multicentre, double-blind study comparing 0.5mg dutasteride vs. placebo daily in men receiving intermittent androgen ablation therapy for prostate cancer.
- An open-label, phase II trial of maximum androgen blockage dose escalation from 50 mg to 150 mg bicalutamide (Casodex®) for biochemical failure in prostate cancer.

- A randomized, double-blind, multicentre, phase II controlled trial assessing ZACTIMA (vandetanib) against placebo in prolonging the off-treatment interval in prostate cancer subjects undergoing intermittent androgen deprivation.
- 4. A multicenter, randomized, placebo-controlled, double-blind phase 3 trial of single-dose intravesical EOquin (Apaziquone) as a surgical adjuvant instilled in the early postoperative period in patients undergoing transurethral resection for noninvasive bladder cancer.

The Continuing Growth of the OE

In June 2008, the Office of Education (OE) began its second year of activity. To date, many significant achievements have been made with the aim of better serving our members

Under the OE umbrel-

la, the Annual Meeting Planning Committee (AMPC) was launched in the fall of 2008. The Committee has a diverse membership including representation from the Central Office, Scientific Co-Chairs, Local Organizing Chairs, and Presidents from past, present and future Annual Meetings led by the VP-Education. The purpose of the AMPC is to discuss ways by which the Annual Meeting could be improved to better suit the needs of members. In the past few months, the Committee has reviewed the 2008 meeting survey and Central Office report, helped develop and review the Needs Assessment Survey, reviewed and suggested standards for speaker honoraria and travel expenses and discussed upcoming Meeting venues. At the recent Winter Executive meeting, it was proposed that the AMPC should become a Standing Committee, as defined in the CUA Bylaws. This proposal will be presented for membership consideration at our AGM in June.

The input from the newly formed AMPC was instrumental in creating the recent Needs Assessment Survey which was distributed to our Active Members in late fall 2008. This survey is a requirement for Royal College accreditation, and this year

we achieved a completion rate of about 35%, which is quite high for a survey of this type. Active Members were encouraged to complete the survey online with the incentive that seven lucky winners would enjoy a \$1,000 getaway at a Fairmont property. Congratulations to David Bell, David Eiley, Guy Girard, Filemon DeJesus, Joao Pippi Salle, Robert Thomas and Luc Valiquette!

Overall, the survey results indicate that members are satisfied with the CUA and consider it a valuable educational resource. With regards to the Annual Meeting, members have expressed interest in having a shorter 3-day meeting from Sunday to Tuesday. An overwhelming majority of survey respondents are happy with the traditional meeting dates - the fourth week of June. A significant minority indicated that they would prefer the Annual Meeting start on Friday and end on Sunday. The AMPC is currently reviewing the feasibility of this option considering our current contracts for upcoming venues and the impact on related meetings that traditionally have been scheduled on the Saturday and Sunday mornings prior to the Annual Meeting. The OE has recently updated the Professional Development section of the CUA website in order to make it easier for members and industry to apply for Section 1 & 3 Accreditation. In the last year, the OE has increased the number of programs that it has accredited. The OE has also been the preferred accrediting body for regional

meetings, such as the New Brunswick Urology Meeting and the Prairie Urological Association Meeting. We encourage all members to seek accreditation for their meetings through our office. We are proud of our simplified and efficient process, our ready access to members via email, CUAJ, the CUA website, and a direct link to the Royal College MAINPORT site.

With an increase in programs to approve, the CPD Committee has welcomed Thomas Whelan (NB) and Scott Murray (ON) to the team. Part of initial tasks will be to review some important programs, such as the Self-Assessment Study Program (SASP) exam and the AUA Updates, and have these programs accredited in the Section 3 (Self-assessment) category so that members can take advantage of these Canadian equivalent credits and report them on MAINPORT.

Lastly, the OE remains a growing resource for many of our members who wish to organize a meeting through our office. The ability to provide a turnkey event organization package, including accreditation, at a competitive rate is heightened by the fact that members are exempt from taxes on these professional services since they are considered an extension of the CUA. To meet our ongoing growth, we have recently welcomed Nadia Pace as Project Manager. Nadia has 3 years experience organizing and executing the Annual Meeting and has developed strong relations with industry. We are confident that she will add to the success of the CUA Office of Education!

The IT Committee's work has been geared to making the CUA a 'paperless' organization. Bylaw changes for 2009

At the Winter Executive Meeting in January, three Bylaw changes were discussed and approved for presentation to members in Toronto. The first change relates to the creation of an Annual Meeting Planning Committee. A new Section VII (q) would read:

- (q) The Annual Meeting Planning Committee (AMPC)
 - (i) The Annual Meeting Planning Committee shall consist of the Vice-President Education, the chairs of the Local Organizing Committees, of the past, present and upcoming Annual Meetings, the Scientific Chairs of the past, present and upcoming Annual Meetings, the President-Elect and the Secretary.
 - (ii) The chair shall be the Vice-President Education.
 - (iii) The AMPC shall be responsible for the long term planning of the Annual Meeting including recommendations to the Executive concerning:
 - A. future meeting venues
 - B. format of the Annual Meeting including its length, specific dates, and general outline
 - C. benefit rates for members contributing to the meeting
 - D. honoraria and benefits for guest speakers

The second major change would be the removal of Article XI concerning Health Councils. These would now become Affiliates Societies of the CUA, thereby resolving some issues that have occurred in the past. This also requires removal of references

to Health Councils in the roles of the Secretary and the Vice-President Education.

Finally, it is proposed to add the President-Elect and the Vice-President Education to the Finance Committee, whose composition would then be the President, the President-Elect, the Vice-President Education, the Treasurer, the Secretary, the chairs of the Local Organizing Committees for the two (2) forthcoming Annual Meetings, and the chair of the Administrative Council of the CUA Scholarship Foundation.

The CUA Executive has decided that new guidelines and revised guidelines published previously will be posted on the CUA website for your review (http://www.cua.org/guidelines_e.asp) and no longer printed and mailed to each member as has been our practice until now. - 2. Renal Cystic Disease Dr. Tom Whelan

- Multicystic Dysplastic Kidney in the Neonate -Dr. Karen Psooy
- 4. ADT and Prostate Cancer Dr. Martin Gleave and Dr. Fred Saad
- 5. Recurrent UTIs in Women Dr. El-Dib and Dr. Anil Kapoor
- BPH Dr. Ryan Paterson, Dr. Tom Whelan and Dr. Hassan Razvi in collaboration with the Canadian Prostate Health Council

In response to CUA members' requests, the Committee will also begin the process of developing draft guideline documents on post-vasectomy care and the metabolic work-up of patients with recurrent urinary stone disease.

I, along with the rest of the Committee (Dr. Marie-Paule Jammal, Dr. Anil Kapoor, Dr. Ryan Paterson, Dr. Tim Wollin, and Dr. Tom Whelan) wish to thank the many CUA members who have devoted their time and expertise to the drafting of these guidelines.

We welcome feedback from CUA members on these guidelines or suggestions for new guideline topics.

We lost a Prince



We have been mourning the passing of a great friend and Past-President of the CUA. He had such a presence for over the past 3 decades that we still cannot believe he is gone. I was fortunate to know and work with Norm during all those years and, for that, I am very thankful. I tried to recruit him to academic urology at Sherbrooke University upon his return from a fellowship with Dr. Gil Vernet and Dr. Richard Turner-Warwick. I thought he would be a great asset to our department. He thought about it seriously, but told me that his calling was to serve the community in Sorel, which he did extremely well for 30 years.

Coming from a poor French farming family, Norm was recruited to enroll in the seminary to become a priest. "What a joke," he would say. He was too much of a "bon vivant" to go that route. Instead, he went on to become a doctor. He served in the army, stationed in Victoria B.C., to pay for his education. While in Victoria, he was able to learn English. After his 3 years of service, he moved to Montréal and started his training at McGill, which is where he met Ms. Marjorie Watts. Love became real for him and Norm and Marjorie embodied the perfect love story... right up until his very last breath.

Norm left his mark on every urological association he ever worked for. When I became President of the CUA in 1993, I gave him and Dr. Jack Sales the task of raising \$1 million for the CUA Scholarship Foundation (CUASF) over the next 3 years. They accomplished this before the deadline and this triumph was the beginning of the impact this program would have on many bright young Canadian urologists. We have him to thank for that! In addition to serving as President of the CUA, Norm was also President of Quebec Urological Association (QUA).

Although he had many successes, Norm could not just sit on his laurels while there was still a job to be done. Following the meeting of the Northeastern Section of the AUA in Cairo, Egypt, which we organized together in 1995, he decided, along with Dr. Datta Wagle and Dr. Jack Sales, to start a scholarship foundation for this NE section. Again, they were successful in achieving their goal. Since then, many scholarships have been awarded to young



Canadian and American urologists thanks to their efforts.

The last big hurrah was when Norm approached me and Dr. Luc Valiquette with the idea of hosting the 1997 meeting of the Societé Internationale d'Urologie (SIU) in Montréal. Although we all worked very hard to make this happen, Norm was the real dynamo behind this initiative. Thanks to Norm and Marjorie, this meeting is still remembered as one of the best meetings ever of the SIU. The impact of this meeting was the turning point for the SIU – which has since been headquartered in Montréal for the past 10 years, with close ties to the CUA. The net profit of the 1997 SIU meeting (\$1 million) was donated to the CUASF (two-thirds of the amount) and the remaining third went to the QUA. We felt this was the best way to disperse the profits, and we were very pleased to do so.

We can be sure that all of these achievements earned him more than enough wings to be able to watch over us with his big smile and wonderful sense of humour. As president of the SIU and Past-President of the CUA, I would be very delighted to see one of the CUA scholarships named in his honour. I hope the CUA will consider this.

Finally, Norm was the life of any party and many of us have enjoyed being with him and Marjorie in many parts of the world, over the past 30 years. We have had lots of fun together – it was like a dream we never wanted to end. Alas, we cannot always get what we want. We lost our Prince Charming – but we have gained a Guardian Angel.
